	On September 22, 2018, Governor Brown announced that he	
	signed into law Assembly Bill ("AB") 747. The law establishes	
	an Administrative Hearings Office within the State Water Resources Control Board (the "Board"). The new office will	
	provide an impartial review process for matters currently	
	brought, heard, and decided by the Board. AB 747 is the	
	California Legislature's second attempt at establishing a new	
	water rights hearings process. A similar bill was vetoed by	
	Governor Brown in 2017.	
	Current Approach to the Adjudication of Water Rights	
	All water within the state is the property of the people of	
	California and existing law provides the state with the authority to protect its water resources. The Board is tasked with setting	
	statewide water policy by balancing uses, regulating pollutants	
	and activities, and supporting the Regional Water Quality	

Control Boards activities. The Board's Executive Director may issue complaints to people who violate certain water regulations, subjecting them to civil liability. The Board may also order actors to cease and desist from behavior that violates, or threatens to violate, the state's water laws and regulations.

Actions brought against alleged violators are prosecuted and adjudicated by the Board. Water users can seek review of the Board's decisions in state court. However, state court judges follow a doctrine of granting deference to agency decisions, making those decisions extremely difficult to overcome. As a result, defendants often feel compelled to settle with the agency, rather than to assert a defense.

The Board's adjudicative procedure is in contrast to other administrative actions by state agencies. Most agencies delegate adjudicative review to the state's Office of Administrative Hearings, where an unbiased third-party judge hears and decides the matter. In the interest of fairness to water users, the Legislature sought to implement a similar administrative hearing process within the Board.

### **New Adjudicative Procedures**

Beginning on July 1, 2019, a new Administrative Hearings Office (the "Office"), housed within the Board, will act as independent hearing officer in water rights adjudicative proceedings for a specific subset of orders the Water Board may issue. The Office will be staffed by attorneys who are experts in water law and who have qualifications equivalent to those of administrative law judges. AB 747, thus provides an impartial review process for water users charged with violating state law.

Specifically, AB 747 requires the Office to hear: (1) complaints that would impose civil liability for the diversion and use of water under Water Code section 1055, related to the unauthorized taking of water; (2) proposed cease and desist

orders for violating, or threatening to violate, requirements for the use of water under a permit, license, certificate, registration or order; and (3) revocations of permits or licenses to appropriate water. The Legislature especially intends the Office to hear water-related cannabis enforcement matters. Hearings must observe state law regarding administrative adjudication.

### **OPERATIONS MANAGER REPORT**

Board of Directors Meeting Monday, October 15th 2018

Treatment Operations – The plant has continued to operate well with no problems to report at this time.

Plant Maintenance –Maintenance included daily cleaning and calibrating of all our process analysis equipment, chemical injection pump maintenance and filter pump/motor maintenance.

I have spent a lot of time talking with the engineers and looking over plans to begin the treatment plant effluent meter upgrade project along with finalizing the plant blow off piping and installation of a new water tight vault around the main effluent meter that will be replaced with a new digital meter to better measure plant production and have other useful capabilities once tied into our S.C.A.D.A. system.

Water Distribution System - In the distribution system, staff performed site inspections for all facilities and conducted manual reading of all remote tank/pump site meters and gauges.

In available time, Jose is still working with the office and continuing to replace/reprogram meters and transmitters that have been reading incorrectly and manually reading meters from the list generated by the office staff that have had zero readings for extended periods of time.

The inspection of the Dollar General water main upgrade has been completed and after all the necessary documentation and fees have been received Dollar General will be dedicating the water main running the length Las Palmas will be dedicated back to the district.

Pete and I have had discussions regarding the integrity of the districts water mains following the flooding of last year. That we know of, there are three areas with certain potential for failure that have not yet been addressed by the county road depts. Panchito is of high concern as at this moment there is nothing holding the road in place but the water main as flood waters eroded around the culvert and under the road leaving it suspended and unsupported. Jardincito Ct. does not appear to be as bad but both of these areas will still need our attention at any time of repairs to the roadway or culvert as our mains run in between the two. The third area of concern is Laredo Dr. where one of the two significant breaks and repairs occurred. It has been brought to my attention that the county still has not done any repairs to this area but motorists have started going around the area of most concern as this particular main could leave hundreds without water again if failure were to reoccur. In addition to motorists neglecting road closures, winter weather is soon approaching and I am almost certain that if repairs aren't made to the culverts and roadways in these areas before ground saturation and seasonal runoff begins, we can almost guarantee main breaks in these three areas.

As well as the treatment plant project, I have also spent time with the engineers going over and approving plans and specific details with the service line replacement project.

Intake – The leak that was reported in the raw water main running down Barret Entrance Rd. is still awaiting scheduling with PG&E to assist due to the fact that a power pole is in too close of proximity to the water main to excavate the area without having the pole supported and or relocated.

Construction has been underway on the districts floating barge and seems to be making decent progress. After talking with the Jason from F&S houseboats, he says he is hopeful to have the barge completed in 90 days or less.

**Education** – I had spent a few days a week for almost two weeks taking classes in order to renew my certifications and Jose is currently taking a class to prepare him for his upcoming T2 exam.

**Customer Service** - In customer service, staffs remaining available time was spent responding to customer service requests and work orders that included meter lock offs and unlocks, meter read requests, meter install or removals, leak identification and underground service alerts.

### **Recommended** Action

### Staff recommends the following motion:

No staff recommendation is provided due to the fact that the Dollar General store has not provided the necessary documentation and bonds for acceptance of the infrastructure.

### Background

This item is on the agenda for consideration by the Board, to formally accept into our maintained water system certain water mains, hydrants and services constructed by the Dollar General store to serve their building. The District entered into a Plan Check and Inspection agreement with the Dollar General dated August 18, 2017. The agreement required the construction of the infrastructure and its dedication to the District following completion and inspection.

The agreement required the following for acceptance of the system by the District:

(a) The Project is finally inspected, tested and approved by the District as provided in Paragraph 6, above;

(b) An engineer's certification that the Project is constructed in substantial conformance with the plans and specifications submitted to the District;

(c) All real property, easements required to provide service through the Project, rights-ofway, permits, licenses, and other approvals to be obtained and delivered to the District have been so obtained and delivered to the District;

(d) The record drawings (reproducible as-builts), specifications, accounting, operation manuals and instructions, CAD disk and warranties have been provided to the District;

(e) Applicant has paid the District all applicable fees and charges of the District, all\_ in accordance with the rules and regulations for the District;

- (f) A detailed accounting of amounts expended for improvements; and
- (g) A list of assessor parcel numbers and service addresses to be served by the Project.

Items d and f have not yet been accomplished as of the date of this report, therefore staff cannot recommend acceptance. The property owner is responsible for all maintenance and repair cost to the system, and any damage or liability caused by the system until accepted by the CSD. Also, we cannot accept the facilities until a maintenance bond is delivered, coving repairs or

replacement of defective work for a period of one y4ear from acceptance of the facilities by the District. We have been, and will continue to actively pursue completion of the dedication, as it is in the best interest of the owner. They were notified and reminded of the requirements for dedication to the District several times over the past six months.

### Background

According to our records LDPCSD and LDPOA entered into an agreement on September 18, 2005 regarding the use and maintenance of the recreation lake located on Lot 737, Unit 2 –M. The agreement is attached for your review. We very much appreciate the cooperation of the LDPOA in facilitating our use and operation of the lake to store golf course irrigation water. We entered into the agreement expecting the golf course water use to continue indefinitely. Due to the closure of the golf course, the District has no ongoing interest in the pond at this time, as the cost of filling/maintaining the pond was paid with revenue from water sales to the golf course.

As it currently stands, all expense associated with filling and maintaining the lake under the current agreement would need to be paid by current LDPCSD customers through their water rates, which could be considered an unauthorized use of such public funds. Unfortunately, the LDPCSD does not receive any property tax or other sources of discretionary revenue to fund this cost, which is not currently related to the water system operation.

Without water sales from the lake, and with no current need for storing water for golf course irrigation, we should consider requesting that the LDPOA consider entering into a revised agreement with the District. We would want to preserve the right for future use of the lake should the irrigation need once again arise.

#### AGREEMENT BETWEEN LAKE DON PEDRO COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT

#### AND

#### LAKE DON PEDRO OWNER'S ASSOCIATION

#### FOR

#### USE AND MAINTENANCE OF RECREATION LAKE IN LOT 737, UNIT 2-M

This Agreement is made this <u>18</u> day of <u>control belo</u>, 2005, by and between Lake Don Pedro Community Services District, a duly formed community services district of the State of California, hereinafter referred to as "District" and Lake Don Pedro Owner's Association, a non-profit corporation incorporated in the State of California, hereinafter referred to as "Association."

#### WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Association is owner of that certain parcel of land located in the County of Mariposa, designated as Lot 737 of Lake Don Pedro, a land subdivision developed by Boise Cascade Recreation Communities, hereinafter referred to as "Boise", said lot having been deeded by Boise to Association; and

WHEREAS, The Deerwood Corporation, a California corporation, referred to herein as "Deerwood," doing business as the Lake Don Pedro Golf and Country Club, as successor to Boise owns and operates an eighteen hole golf course within said subdivision, hereinafter referred to as Golf Course and has contracted with District to supply water for irrigation of Golf Course; and

WHEREAS, said Lot 737 contains an earthen dam constructed for the purpose of storing water and creating a lake, hereinafter referred to as "Lake", the waters of which overlie much of the area of Lot 737, which "Lake" is used by District as an integral part of the system for delivering water for irrigation of Golf Course; and

WHEREAS, District in the exercise of its function of delivering water to Golf Course has, prior to conveyance by Boise of Lot No. 737 to Association, constructed works for metering and discharging water into Lake and these works for said function and for this purpose requires certain rights be granted it by Association within Lot 737.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY AGREED and understood by and between the parties as follows:

(1) Association hereby grants to District all rights to Lot 737 and Lake that are necessary or convenient for the present or future storing and delivery of water to Golf Course and for construction, maintenance and operation of the water system existing or to be constructed thereon for said purpose. Said

rights include rights-of-way for ingress and egress and for construction and/or reconstruction in any manner necessary and for operation and maintenance of dam, spillway, inlet works, pipelines, pumps, meters and related structures and appurtenances together with the right to control water level in Lake. Any construction of above ground facilities (buildings, pump houses, etc.) additional to those existing as of the date hereof shall require approval of Association prior to construction thereof, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.

District agrees that Lake level will be maintained at or close to present spillway level at all times except as raised by flood or lowered under conditions that may require lower levels on a temporary basis for safety or maintenance.

- (3) District agrees to save Association harmless from any cause that may arise as a result of exercise of the rights granted hereunder and further agrees that normal enjoyment and use of Lake by Association for recreational purposes will not be restricted or hampered by District except as may be occasioned by existence of its work or may from time to time be necessary for construction, repair or protection of its facilities.
- (4) District agrees to assume responsibility for maintaining the dam and spillway pertaining to Lake and will undertake at its expense any construction deemed by District to be necessary for safety and security of these structures.
- (5) Association agrees that any rights it may have acquired to water collected in Lake from natural sources are hereby conveyed to District, it being understood that Boise has heretofore made a similar conveyance of water rights to District and by this provision all rights to water collected in Lake and its tributaries are and will continue to be the property of District.
- (6) District agrees to accept responsibility for compliance with all governmental rules and regulations relating to its use of the Lake, specifically including water quality, to the extent that water quality is affected by District operations, or water, supplied to the Lake by District.
  - The term of this Agreement shall be for 15 years from the date of execution of this Agreement, or until termination of irrigation of the Golf Course, whichever is longer, at the end of which period District shall have the right to renegotiate for an additional term of years.
- (8) This Agreement shall be binding upon the respective successors in interest and assigns of District and Association.

SUBJECT: LDPCSD and LDPOA Agreement for Gregoris Pond

As manager of the Lake Don Pedro Owners Association, I am writing at the direction of the Board of the Board of Directors in regard to needed maintenance to the dam at Gregoris Pond.

It has recently come to the Board's attention that the dam is in urgent need of repair at this time. Erosion has resulted in missing dirt and bare rock showing in some areas. In addition, it appears that some type of animal has dug at least one hole through the dam which allows water to come through. In sum, the dam is in peril of failing. With winter rains around the corner, this is a serious hazard and should the dam fail, flooding and extensive property damage will occur.

The Association's agreement with LDPCSD, Resolution 2005-11, states the following in this regard:

"District agrees to assume responsibility for maintaining the dam and spillway pertaining to Lake and will undertake at its expense any construction deemed by District to be necessary for safety and security of these structures."

The Board respectfully requests that the dam be inspected a this time and that repairs be made as needed as soon as possible to avoid any potential of dam failure and flooding this winter. ### **Recommended** Action

#### **Staff recommends the following motion:**

I move to direct staff to prepare a plan for implementation of availability fees for all vacant parcels within the District boundaries

### Background

When the District was formed in 1980, an availability fee was established through a public hearing and board action. The fee was ultimately included specifically in state law due to the fact that it was higher than the \$10 per acre allowed by general law. The section of the old CSD law is below:

61765.15: Notwithstanding Section 61765, in the Lake Don Pedro Community Services District, the water standby or availability charge shall not exceed sixty dollars (\$60) per year for each acre of land on which the charge is levied or sixty dollars (\$60) per year for a parcel less than one acre. This section, applicable only to the Lake Don Pedro Community Services District, is necessary because of the unique and special water management and financing problems in the area included within the district.

The District water regulations also address the availability fee as follows: G. WATER STANDBY/AVAILABILITY CHARGE:

 Water Standby/Availability Charge: Applicable to all unimproved lots and parcels where metered service is available, but where such is not requested and installed.

2. <u>Rate:</u> The schedule is hereby fixed at \$60.00\* per year per acre times the number of acres in such parcel but with a minimum \$60.00 per parcel and a maximum of \$180.00 per parcel. The \$60.00 per acre charge for parcels larger than one acre, but smaller than three acres shall be prorated for each fractional acre rounded off to the nearest one tenth acre. The size of lots for purposes of fixing charges shall be based upon the Assessor's maps and records of the Counties of Mariposa and Tuolumne and the maps and records of the Lake Don Pedro Community Services District.

The purpose of the fee is to pay a proportional share of the cost to keep the existing water system in a "ready to serve" condition in the event these parcels choose to connect to the system sin the future. This item is on the Board's agenda due to the finding that many vacant parcels located within the District boundaries are not currently paying the availability fee, and should be. A presentation will be provided at this meeting to graphically depict the parcels currently not paying the fee. Staff seeks Board direction to immediately begin implementing the fee for all vacant parcels in the district.

e. Report on the status of completion of the State Water Resources Control Board's evaluation of the Merced Irrigation District's Place of Use boundary for Water Rights License 11395.

### **Recommended** Action

No action is recommended as this item is a status report only.

### Background

On June 13, 2018 the State Water Rights staff responded to the District that the Place of Use maps submitted early in 2018 were accepted as the correct depiction of the POU boundaries. Unfortunately, on August 30, 2018 the SWRCB staff sent an email to the District requesting clarification on the boundaries in a specific area of concern, as identified in the attached email, and boundary maps referenced in the email.

Over the past month, District staff, mapping consultant and legal counsel have been reviewing District records to identify the source of the discrepancy, if any, and to locate data to support a definitive boundary determination. This has been a very interesting and revealing process reviewing all of the original District maps, and subsequent annexations since the early 1980s to identify the appropriate documentation to verify the intended location of the original Place of Use Boundary with the state.

The documentation reveals that the original Water Rights License 11395 Place of Use filing was intended to mirror the boundaries of the Sierra Highlands Water Company, the predecessor in interest to the Lake Don Pedro CSD. The Sierra Highlands Water Company Boundaries were surveyed in the development of the legal description for the creation of the Lake Don Pedro CSD (LDPCSD) in 1980. The legal description of the initial LDPCSD boundary clearly describes the boundary as following the Tuolumne/Mariposa County line in the area of the identified discrepancies between the maps provided by state staff in their email.

As the legal description provides a definitive POU boundary determination that encompasses all of the parcels in question, we believe that an administrative boundary correction can be made by the State Water Rights division. We have submitted this documentation to the state.

- 1. The Resolution of the Mariposa County Local Agency Formation Commission establishing the LDPCSD, using the Sierra Highlands Water Company boundaries
- 2. The 1978 Place of Use map showing the POU and Sierra Highlands Water Company boundaries as coterminous
- 3. The Legal Description of the LDPCSD boundaries, with the area in question highlighted beginning on page 7 and ending on page 9. The legal description should be viewed with the Boundary map file attachment
- 4. A screen shot to show as highlighted the original LDPCSD/Sierra Highlands boundaries based on the legal description
- 5. Pages from the Assessor's parcel maps which correlate directly with the legal description. For reference we have numbered the 39 courses described in the legal description on pages 7 and 8.
- 6. A copy of the August 30, 2018 email from the state, and the two referenced maps prepared by MID and LDPCSD

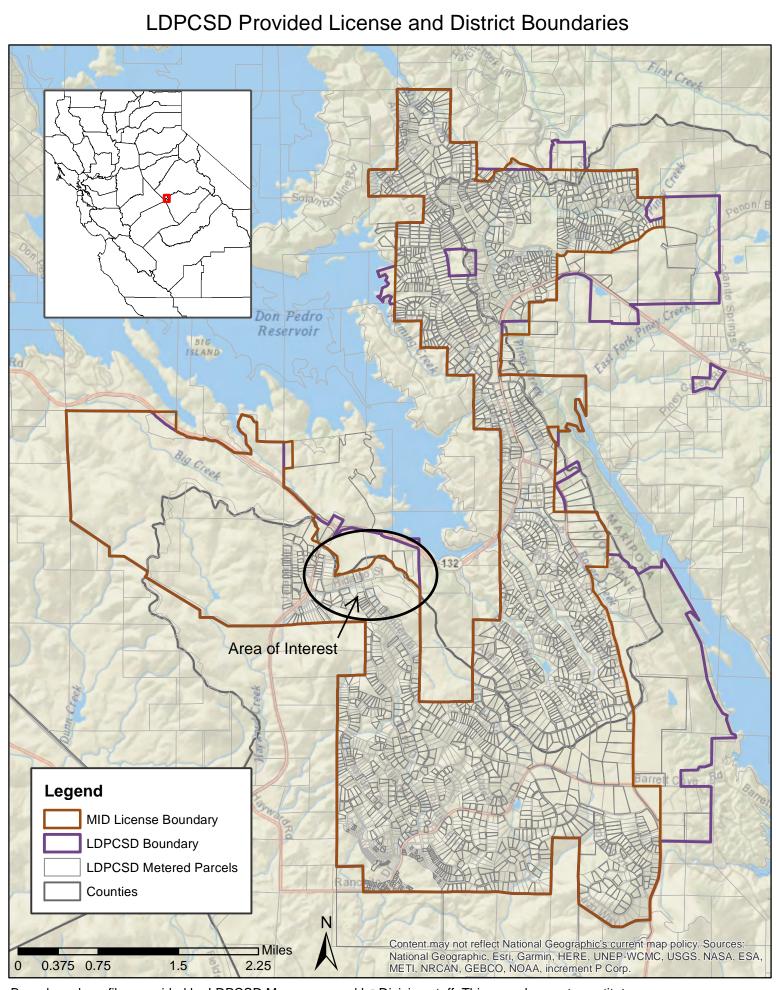
Mr. Eltal and Mr. Kampa,

I've recently separately received Place of Use (POU) boundary maps (license 11395) for Lake Don Pedro CSD (LDPCSD) from both MID and LDPCSD. After comparing both maps, there appears to be some discrepancies that I would like to make you aware of. The POU boundary provided by MID is from 2008 and more closely matches what is in the records of the Division. The POU boundary map provided by LDPSCD was created by the same engineering firm that created the boundary map provided by MID, is more recent, and appears to follow certain parcel/county boundaries in one key location. I've attached both maps, and labeled the area where there is concern regarding the water rights complaint. Can you comment on or resolve these boundary discrepancies? We are trying to resolve the boundary issue in order to complete our investigation for the complaint filed against LDPCSD. Depending on which boundary is actually correct, there may be several parcels that are outside of the POU and cannot be served with water from MID's water right license.

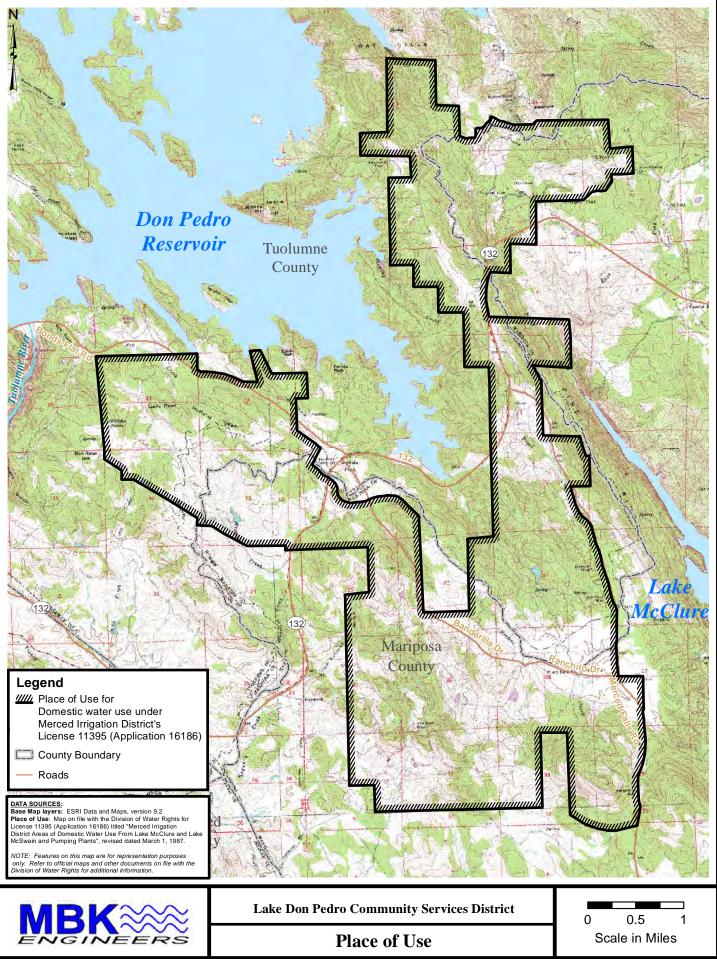
Since the water right is held by MID, and their map more closely matches what is on file at the Division, we would have to abide by that POU boundary in the event of any disagreement. Changes to the POU may be made through the change petition process, unless it is demonstrated that some administrative error was made by the Division. However, we also understand that LDPCSD has supplemented all outside POU water supply with groundwater since 2015, thus there are likely no ongoing noncompliance with the POU term of the MID license.
